

What is PE and Sport Premium Funding?

The government have pledged £150 million per annum for the next 3 years to support PE and school sport in primary schools. The PE and Sport Premium Funding is ring-fenced and therefore can only be spent on provision for PE and sport in schools. This funding is being jointly provided by the Departments for Education, Health and Culture, Media and Sport. The government have also announced a further commitment to PE and sport until 2020 if they are elected in the next general election.

We will be held accountable for how we have used the additional funding to support pupils' progress and participation in PE and school sport. We are required to publish online information about how we have used the additional funding, including details about our sporting provision alongside curriculum details. This will ensure that parents, carers and others are made fully aware of the PE and sporting opportunities available to the Primary pupils at Hollinwood Academy.

How is the PE and Sport Premium Funding allocated?

- The PE and Sport Premium funding is allocated to each individual school by the payment of a lump sum.
- Hollinwood Academy received £17,500 in 2017-2018 and we received £16,800 in 2018 -2019

How is the Sport Premium Funding allocated?

The government has recommended,
"Schools can choose how they use the funding, for example to:

- hire specialist PE teachers or qualified sports coaches to work with primary teachers during PE lessons
- support and involve the least active children by running after-school sports clubs and holiday clubs, e.g. the Change4Life clubs
- provide resources and training courses in PE and sport for teachers
- run sport competitions or increase pupils' participation in the School Games
- run sports activities with other schools." (DfE website)

National Aim:

The National Curriculum for physical education aims to ensure that all pupils:

- develop competence to excel in a broad range of physical activities
- are physically active for sustained periods of time
- engage in competitive sports and activities

National Targets:

- The national targets set out by the government in the National Curriculum inform the PE long term plan at Hollinwood Academy.
- KS1 pupils should develop fundamental movement skills, become increasingly competent and confident and access a broad range of opportunities to extend their agility, balance and coordination, individually and with others. They should be able to engage in competitive (both against self and against others) and co-operative physical activities, in a range of increasingly challenging situations.
- KS2 pupils should continue to apply and develop a broader range of skills, learning how to use them in different ways and to link them to make actions and sequences of movement. They should enjoy communicating, collaborating and competing with each other. They should develop an understanding of how to improve in different physical activities and sports and learn how to evaluate and recognise their own success.

How will Hollinwood Academy spend the PE and Sport Premium Funding?**Sustainability:**

At Hollinwood Academy we aim to use this money to create a sustainable curriculum for all children. Therefore some of the money provided by the funding will be invested in the professional development of staff and as a result should enhance the quality of teaching for all children. The school team has ensured that the PE curriculum for all the primary pupils including the reception setting is delivered with a sports teacher from within the MAT. To ensure that the school can sustain and support , we plan to bring in coaches to skill up the teaching staff on the delivery of PE. As a result, the quality of children's learning and development should be improved. All pupils in primary have access to a 30 minute swimming lesson once a week which enhances the PE provision offered.

What impact has the PE and Sport Premium Funding had on PE and school sport?

We will evaluate the impact of the PE and Sport Premium Funding as part of our normal self-evaluation and provision mapping arrangements. We will look at how well we use our PE and Sport Premium Funding to improve the quality of PE and sporting provision, including increasing participation in PE and sport so that all children develop healthy lifestyles and reach the performance levels they are capable of.

The PE and Sports Premium funding was spent on a range of areas:

Prince William Award – This programme was delivered by an external provider ‘Skill Force’ to three Key Stage Two classes (30 pupils in total).

Cost: £6000 for the full year.

Through The Prince William Award we help young people build their character, resilience and confidence to empower them to “be their best”.

At the heart of this aspiration are our brilliant instructors, the majority of whom have served their country in the British Armed Forces. These ‘heroes in schools’ embody the Service values and understand the importance of teamwork, resilience and self-discipline. They are the complementary role models that many children need working alongside their teachers.

The key themes delivered through the programme enable young people to develop an understanding of their individual character, their character within a team and developing leadership and responsibility.

Swimming Lessons – all our primary pupils have a weekly swimming lesson which is facilitated at New Bridge School. 64% of pupils leaving Primary school in Year 6 could swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres.

For the whole of primary 92 pupils 32 can swim 25m+ = 34.8%.

Out of 18 Year 6 pupils 12 can swim 25m+ = 66.7%

Costing: £2000 is used out of the Primary Sports Budget to cover some of the cost of using the facilities at New Bridge School

Yoga – we now have a qualified Yoga teacher who works with pupils in Primary delivering Yoga sessions

Cost: £8000 for the full year

Yoga supports and provides the primary pupils with;

- It provides pupils healthy ways to balance their emotions and manage stress.
- It **creates a calm classroom environment.**

- It improves pupils' listening skills.
- Encourages children to respect themselves as well as others.
- Enhances focus, concentration and memory (which all children need to learn effectively).
- Enhances communication skills, as well as a child's organisational skills.
- Encourages community in the classroom.
- Helps pupils learn to be in the present moment.
- Enhances motor skills and balance.
- Expands **creativity** and imagination.
- Improves ability of mindful thoughts and actions.

School Sports League – Our PE curriculum lead is working with Oldham's sports partnership so that pupils can take part in competitive sporting matches. A kit for the school has been purchased to support this.

Cost: £200

Outdoor Education – this now forms part of the curriculum on offer in many of the KS2 classes at Hollinwood. Staff support pupils to access the community provisions in the local area. Pupils go to the park, not only supporting and encouraging pupils to develop the physical skills but to learn life skills in conducting themselves in the community.

Purchase outdoor equipment; Waterproof clothing, Wellies

Cost:£500

What action do we need to further develop Primary PE and School sports?

This academic year we have appointed a member of staff to Coordinate the PE provisions for the School. This member of staff is accountable not only for quality PE lessons but to support staff training.

- Enhance the staffing team's confidence, knowledge and skills for teaching PE and sport by providing a PE coach from MCFC to teach alongside the teachers.
- Enhance the gymnastic provision by training the NB Mat PE staff and Primary Staff so that they are better equipped to deliver quality lessons.
- Review the PE planning and assessment framework on the school's Dashboard
- Purchase more primary PE equipment such as benches and mats to develop pupils gymnastic skills
- Join the Oldham primary schools sports league
- Develop an Outdoor Education Curriculum and purchase waterproof clothing for the pupils.
